

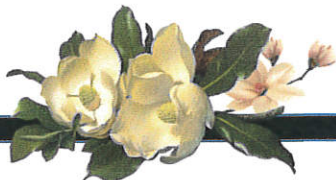


## Category 1, Section I *(Community Project – Moffett Gravel Drive)*

“Moffett Graveling Begins!” - June 25, 2019

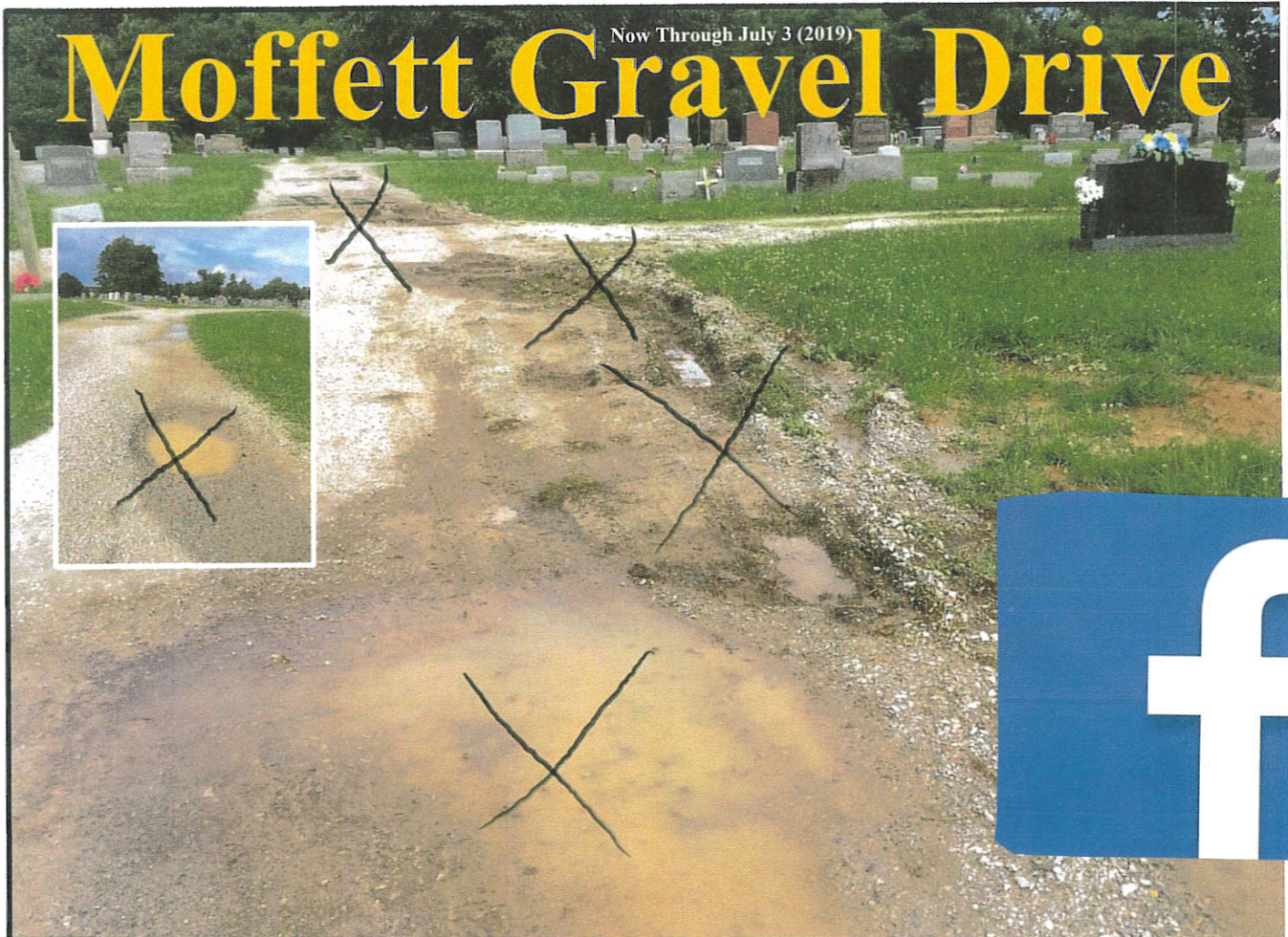
On most June mornings, the sweet fragrance of honeysuckle, songs of nature and a beautiful sunrise embellish the tranquility of Moffett Cemetery. But today, the clatter of diesel engines, the whiff of stagnant water and the strike of steel scoops afforded a most welcomed interruption and sight. Shortly after 8 a.m. the first load of gravel for the community Moffett Gravel Drive arrived. Without hesitation, the volunteers fired up their machines to grade the road and fill in the voluminous number of pot holes and long stretches of deteriorated roads. Families, neighbors and friends, with loved ones buried there, have been most generous and gracious to donate to the drive which will continue through Wednesday, July 3. All monetary gifts are being placed in a special account which will be overseen by Neil Bryant and Terry Coffin of Farmers Bank of Milton. Morgan & Nay Funeral Centre, headed by Rodney Nay, and Ohio Valley Excavating, led by Steve Leach, recently spearheaded the voluntary endeavor to repair the roads battered by elements and weathered by age. "Getting There, Gravel by Gravel" - Moffett Update 6-26-19

In less than 36 hours, the potholes and the long, deep ruts have vanished at Moffett Cemetery, thanks to the compassion and generosity of numerous families, businesses and City of Milton. Volunteer workers yesterday and today have graded the road base and covered the once deteriorated roadways with eight loads of gravel. The project, however, is not complete. Steve Leach of Ohio Valley Excavating said the newly graveled roads should be allowed to settle, undergo a couple of rains and feel the load of traffic before they are graded one more time and topped off with another layer of gravel. In addition to improved roads throughout the cemetery, visitors and drivers of funeral vehicles also will appreciate a slightly wider road as well as wider intersections to facilitate turning. To complete the project and help maintain the roadways when damaging weather conditions and age returns, any donation to the Moffett Gravel Drive would be most appreciated. Donations may be made to Morgan & Nay Funeral Centre (in person or mailed to PO Box 250 - Madison, IN 47250, dropped off at the City of Milton Municipal Building or deposited directly at Farmers Bank of Milton which is overseeing the account. Morgan & Nay Funeral Centre and Ohio Valley Excavating are serving as voluntary organizers of the project. With 100 percent of all donations going to the endeavor, the Moffett Gravel Drive will end Wednesday, July 3 (2019).

"What a Difference Two Weeks Make" - Update 7-1-19

Two weeks ago today when Morgan & Nay Funeral Centre and Ohio Valley Excavating voluntarily initiated the Moffett Gravel Drive, large potholes, stretches of dirt and long, deep ruts earmarked one of Trimble County's most used and beautiful cemeteries. Funeral vehicles, processions and daily visitors had to battle these road conditions to gain access to their loved ones' graves or sites of closure. But in 14 days, the compassion and generosity of families, individuals, businesses and church communities have changed the traveling terrain. The roadways have been graded, slightly widened and covered with 12 loads of gravel (264 tons). Once the new gravel settles a little more, another layer of stone will be applied. The official gravel drive ends tomorrow, July 3, 2019. What a difference two weeks can make when people work together for a cause close to home and dear to their hearts.
